Archery Range COVID-19 Policies and Procedures

THE CLUB IS OPEN FOR MEMBERS ONLY.
NO GUESTS ALLOWED AT THIS TIME.

**All members MUST read and COMPLY with the following updated RULES.
These policies will remain in effect until further notice.**

DO NOT enter the property if you are showing **ANY** signs of COVID-19, even if symptoms are “mild”:

- Fever;
- Cough;
- Runny nose;
- Sore throat;
- Shortness of breath;
- have traveled outside BC in the last 14 days.
- have been in contact with someone, who has been sick

*All participants will be required to undergo COVID-19 screening prior to entering the range.
Screening will include visual and verbal checks of each individual*

Personal Distancing & PPE:

- All members are required to comply with physical distancing rules by practicing social distancing and keeping six feet (two meters) away from one another at all times.
- There will be no sharing of any equipment (bows, arrows, tools, etc) between non-household members.
- Where there is a need to touch common areas, such as target faces / 3D targets, Antiseptic Hand Sanitizer, wipes and/or gloves will be provided.
- Face mask use by Athletes will not generally be required, they may optionally be used.

Range Schedule:

- The Range at Selvey Park will be open on Tuesdays and Thursdays 6:00pm-7:30pm:
- and on Saturdays 10:00am – 1:00pm

Pre-Registration:

- PRE-REGISTRATION IS MANDATORY.
- Go to <https://forms.gle/jichKyFU1DDXYRfBA> to pre-register.
- Only 1 spot/ week per member.
- Registration cut-off is 24hrs prior to start

Arrival/Exit:

- Please arrive at the range 10 minutes before the start the Time-Slot in which you pre-registered.
- Always maintain a 2m Physical Distance while entering the range and wait in a spot where anyone entering behind you is able to safely maintain Physical Distance.
- After you are done shooting, remove your target from the target bale and spray/wipe down your target bale with bleach solution
- After cleaning up your target, please leave the range immediately.
Please do not loiter in the parking lot for any longer than absolutely necessary. Vacate the property as quickly as possible.

Check-In:

- Check-In will be contactless. Upon arriving at the Check-In desk, participants will be required to confirm their identity to the Range Officer and then will be assigned a Shooting Lane and Waiting Location.
- Following Shooting Lane Assignment, the Participant will proceed directly to their Waiting Location.

Range Capacity & Usage:

- All participants MUST be fully self-sufficient and must have their own equipment.
- Club equipment will not be available for rental at this time; participants must have their own equipment.
- **No instruction will be given at this time.**
- The range will have a maximum capacity of 8 shooting lanes (plus one range officer).
- Up to 2 people from the same household can shoot on the same target
- Stay in your lane when retrieving arrows
- All participants bring a folding chair to hold all belongings directly behind the athlete

Shooting, Scoring, Retrieving Arrows and Missing Arrows:

- The entire field will be moving together
- Maximum 6 arrows per end, this will be monitored and possibly adjusted for those working on volume only if the line is not being held up
- Please supply your own notebook and pen for scoring
- Be respectful of the time taken when scoring, retrieving arrows, and walking back to the shooting line
- If you have difficulty retrieving an arrow and need assistance, notify the range officer
- Report all missing arrows to the range officer

Cleaning Procedures:

- The cleaning schedule will include:

Item	Action
Athlete's equipment including but not limited to arm guards, finger tabs, slings, spotting scopes, bow stands, quiver	All athlete equipment must be wiped down before and after visiting the range No shared/borrowed equipment No equipment provided
Target butts	One athlete per butt per session, one butt has been designated as family in same household Athletes will uncover/cover with sanitized hands Coaches will sanitize between sessions with dilute bleach
Target faces	One will be provided at your first session, bring with you for next session,
Target pins	One set will be provided, bring with you for next session
Scoreboard, paper, pen	Will not be provided, bring your own
Equipment bin	Only coaches enter bin
Seating	No spectator seating
Port-a-potty	Sanitizer in Biffy -please always use it Please wipe down the door handle after use

- It is recommended that all participants bring their own sanitizing equipment such as a diluted bleach solution that meets BC CDC Standards (see document posted at range).
- If a participant does not bring their own sanitizing equipment, there will be diluted bleach solution at the range for cleaning.

Additional items to bring

Hand sanitizer and wipes
A folding chair All personal equipment must be placed in a chair directly behind the athlete shooting position
Target face One will be supplied free of charge on the first visit, bring with you to all sessions or bring your own
Target face pins One set will be supplied free of charge on the first visit, bring with you to all sessions or bring your own
Water Bring water and keep it in your folding chair. Do not bring food onto the range
Additional items based on the weather Sunscreen, hat, rain gear including waterproof footwear

Please respect other members.

If we all follow the rules, we will be able to operate safely and enjoy our sport.

All participants must follow these regulations and comply with the Range Officer on duty. Repeated failure to comply with any safety, personal distance, or range capacity rule will result in an immediate suspension of your membership.

Range Rules may be updated at any time. Any changes will be posted at the range.

CLEANING AND DISINFECTANTS FOR PUBLIC SETTINGS

Good cleaning and disinfection are essential to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in BC.

This document provides advice to public groups, transit, schools, universities, and other institutions in BC on cleaning for non-health care settings.

Make sure to wash hands with plain soap and water after cleaning or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.



OR



Cleaning: the physical removal of visible soiling (e.g., dust, soil, blood, mucus). Cleaning removes, rather than kills, viruses and bacteria. It is done with water, detergents, and steady friction from cleaning cloth.

Disinfection: the killing of viruses and bacteria. A disinfectant is only applied to objects; never on the human body.

All visibly soiled surfaces should be cleaned before disinfection.

Cleaning for the COVID-19 virus is the same as for other common viruses. Cleaning products and disinfectants that are regularly used in households are strong enough to deactivate coronaviruses and prevent their spread.

Recommendations:

- General cleaning and disinfecting of surfaces should occur at least once a day.
- Clean and disinfect highly touched surfaces at least twice a day and when visibly dirty (e.g., door knobs, light switches, cupboard handles, grab bars, hand rails, tables, phones, bathrooms, keyboards).
- Remove items that cannot be easily cleaned (e.g., newspapers, magazines, books, toys).

Cleaning

For cleaning, water and detergent (e.g., liquid dishwashing soap), or common household cleaning wipes should be used, along with good physical cleaning practices (i.e., using strong action on surfaces).

Disinfection

For disinfection, common household disinfectants such as ready-to-use disinfecting wipes and pre-made solutions (no dilution needed) can be used. Use the figure and table below for guidance. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions printed on the bottle.

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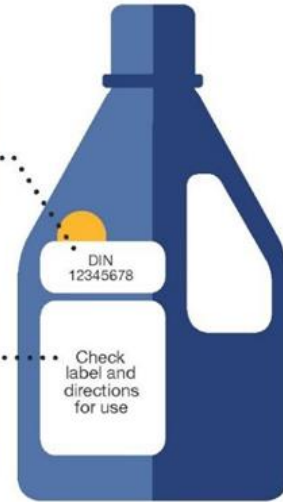
CLEANING AND DISINFECTANTS FOR PUBLIC SETTINGS

See Health Canada's **List of hard-surface disinfectants for use against coronavirus (COVID-19)** for specific brands and disinfectant products.

Drug Identification Number (DIN):
A DIN is an 8-digit number given by Health Canada that confirms it is approved for use in Canada.

Agents effective against coronavirus:

- Bleach: sodium hypochlorite (5.25%)
- Hydrogen peroxide (0.5%)
- Alkyl dimethyl ammonium chlorides



IMPORTANT NOTES:

- Ensure disinfectant product has a Drug Identification Number (DIN) on its label.
- Follow product instructions for dilution, contact time and safe use.
- All visibly dirty surfaces should be cleaned BEFORE disinfecting (unless otherwise stated on the product).

List of disinfecting agents and their working concentrations known to be effective against coronaviruses^{1,2}:

Agent and concentration	Uses
1. 1:100 dilution Chlorine: household bleach – sodium hypochlorite (5.25%)* 10 ml bleach to 990 ml water	Used for disinfecting surfaces (e.g., hand railings, grab handles, door knobs, cupboard handles). Make fresh daily and allow surface to air dry naturally.
2. 1:50 dilution Chlorine: household bleach - sodium hypochlorite (5.25%)* 20 ml bleach to 980 ml water	Used for disinfecting surfaces contaminated with bodily fluids and waste like vomit, diarrhea, mucus, or feces (after cleaning with soap and water first). Make fresh daily and allow surface to air dry naturally.
3. Hydrogen Peroxide 0.5%	Used for cleaning and disinfecting surfaces (e.g., counters, hand rails, door knobs).
4. Quaternary Ammonium Compounds (QUATs): noted as 'alkyl dimethyl ammonium chlorides' on the product label	Used for disinfecting surfaces (e.g., floors, walls, furnishings).
